The **Doing Things with Stories Global Participation Intensive** is a mentored open contest that invite narrative practitioners – artists, researchers, activists, designers, civil society actors, community organisers, academics – to co-create a book that answers 3 questions:

- ① How do we tell stories that matter?
- ② How do we spread stories to build collectives?
- ③ How do we create stories to orient us towards hope?

25 selected entries will be awarded 250 Euros, a spotlight on the various platforms, and further engagement opportunities with the networks that support this project.

MENTORED Open Contest prepares you to apply for the contest:

- Draw on experience, expertise and experiments of 10 global narrative practitioners
- Mentoring through a 5-episode online deep-dive
- New knowledge and provocative directions for narrative change practice
- Collective, creative and community driven modes of telling stories
